am exceptionally proud to present the 2022 Annual Report of the Philippine Fisheries Development Authority (FFDA). This Report highlights the significant accomplishments made by the FFDA in a fiscal year 2022 It was a year marked by a confluence of changes but we were able to finish the year in a stronger position than ever.

Despite challenging economic headwinds, the PFDA was able to perform better fiscially compared to the previous years with a gross income of PHP 902.7 million Furthermore, the agency was able to record a total unloading volume of 543.146 metric tons (MT) of fish and sherpy products this year. All of these were made possible by the continuous rehabilitation and improvement projects of the agency.

Speaking of rehabilitation and improvement, the year 2022 witnessed leaps and bounds in terms of the ongoing infrastructure projects of the agency. The rehabilitation and improvement of the PFDA-Lucens Fish Port Complex (PFDA-LFPC) has successfully concluded tilts year. Our Regional Fish Ports (RFP) in Iloilo and Davao are now more than 80% completed. The rest of our RFPs are also currently in various stages of implementation. These achievements align well with our vision to be the leader of fishery postharvet services towards a food secure and resilient Philippines by 2025.

Our pursuit of excellence and quality service defined our 46th year in service in 2022, Eve of our RFPs and the Central Office maintained their international Organization for Standardization (ISO) 90012015 certificates after successfully complying with the requirements of the annual surveillance audit Furthermore, we also received the Certificate of Compliance this year with the set of Freedom of Information requirements for the FOI 2021 implementation. These achievements validate the agency's commitment to provide unhampered services and quality products to all clients, stakeholders, and interested parties.

Our agency's banner Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) program, the IsDA ON THE GO (IOTG) Program, also made great strides this year Because of the successful collaboration between PFDA and the Cooperative Development Authority (CDA) in the past year, the PFDA was recognized for its invaluable support to cooperatives in the country during the CDA Gawad Parangal 2022. As of today, the IOTG program proudly maintains its partnership with 110 cooperative partners and market areas all around the country.

ABOUT PFDA

he Philippine Fisheries Development Authority (PFDA) is a **government instrumentality with corporate powers (GICP)** attached to the Department of Agriculture (DA) mandated to strengthen the government's developmental thrusts in fisheries through a program that would balance production ventures with adequate postharvest support facilities.

Since its establishment in 1976, the PFDA is vested with the powers and responsibilities of promoting growth in the fishing industry and improving efficiency in the handling preserving marketing and distribution of fish and fishery products. These objectives are carried out through the establishment and administration of fish ports, fish markets, and other infrastructure such as ice plants, cold storage facilities, and processing centers, that are necessary for the continuing advancement of the fishing industry.

As of today, the Authority is effectively managing **nine (9) regional operating units** located in strategic locations and major fish landing centers in the country under the Regional Fish Ports Program. In addition, the PFDA has also led the establishment of **136 project locations** across the country under the Municipal Fish Ports Program. To satisfy the ice requirements of the ports, there are **seven (7) operational ice-making machines** of different magnitudes and **cold storages** of varying capacities implemented by PFDA under the lice Plants and Cold Storage Facilities Program.

PFDA ANNUAL REPORT EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

ursuant to its mandate, the PFDA sustained the operation of the nine (9) Regional Fish Ports (RFPs), namely: Navotas, Iloilo, Zamboanga, Camaligan, Lucena, Sual, Davao, General Santos, Bulan Fish Port

As of December 31.2022, the volume of fish unloaded at the regional fish port complexes reached a total of \$43,146 metric tons (MT). The General Santos and Navotas Fish Port Complexes were the two (2) biggest contributors with 48% and 36% contributions to the total fish unloading, respectively. The remaining 16% was contributed by the other seven (7) RFPs. The total number of fishing and non-fishing vessel arrivals reached 90.727.

Insofar as processing activity is concerned. 1,787.99 MT of their yand non-fishery products were processed in the refrigeration facilities of General Santos. Zamboanga, and Camaligan Fish Ports. Moreover, the total volume of ice produced at Zamboanga. Davao, and General Santos Fish Ports was recorded at 29.836.29 MT.

In 2022, the rehabilitation and improvement of the PFDA-Lucena Fish Port Complex (PFDA-LFPC) was successfully completed Meanwhile, the libilion and Davao RFPs are now more than 80% completed. The rest of RFPs are currently in various stages of implementation.

In 2022, five PFDA RFPs and the Central Office maintained their International Organization for Standardzation (ISO) 90012015 certificates after successfully complying with the requirements of the annual surveillance audit. Furthermore, the agency also


received the Certificate of Compliance this year with the set of Freedom of Information requirements for the FOI 2021 implementation.

The isDA ON THE GO (iOTG) program participated in trading fish and fishery products at DA KADIWA ni Ani at Kita. in partnership with LGUs and Cooperatives. To make sure that almost every family can have access to affordable and quality fresh-frozen fish, the iOTG program has identified communities in strategic locations not only within Metro Manila, but also in various provinces like Rizal. Bulacan, Tarlac Pampanga. Nueva Ecija. Cavite. Laguna. Batangas, and Sorsogon. The iOTG program sold ST/17 metric tons (MT) of fish and fishery products (bangus, tilapia, squid, fresh and frozen GG & strimp) in 2022.

In January 2022, the PFDA, through the PFDA-Davao Fish Port Complex (PFDA-DFPC), delivered 3 tons of frozen fish and 3 tons of construction materials in Sogod as part of the agency's relief efforts for the Typhoon Odette affected communities in Visayas and Mindanao In addition, the PFDA Central Office and Navotas Fish Port Complex (PFDA-NFPC) also distributed 100 boxes of frozen fish and 500 relief boxes to typhoon-it families in several barangays in Sogod. In total, 7,250 typhoonaffected families benefited from the relief operations conducted by the agency. Moreover, in June 2022. the PFDA, through the PFDA-Bulan Fish Port Complex (PFDA-BFPC), distributed approximately 116 metric tons (MT) of tamban (bali sardinella) to Mt Bulusan eruption victims from the municipalities of Juban, and Irosin. Sorsogon to provide them with a much-needed The nine (9) RFPs have issued a total of 46.162 Permist to Conduct Business (PTCBs) for CY 2022 The GSFPC issued a total of 21.498 PTCB for CY 2022 (47% of the total) This was followed by NFPC. which contributed 32% or 14.54 of the total PTCB issued. The increase in the issuance of PTCBs can be primarily attributed to the sustained strict implementation of the 'No ID. No Entry' Policy of all regional fish ports in the observance of the national government's mandate to undertake measures towards the ration's adaptation to the 'new normal'.

The agency has committed the development of three (3) systems—Client Digital Queueing System. Document Management System and Online Transaction System—by the end of CY 2022 Four (4) systems, namely Job Request System (JRS), Key Performance Indicator (KPI) System Online Competency and Profiling System (OCPS), and Preventive Maintenance System (PMS), were installed and implemented at the Central Office. The enhancement of three (3) systems—integrated Corporate Reporting System (CRS). Corporate Information System Portal, and Administrative Management Information System was also done in 2022.

With the improvement rating of 98.87% of the agency-wide personnel in 2021, the agency re-established its baseline in 2022 with the inclusion of newly identified competencies that need to be improved. Given this, the ASD-HRD conducted another competency profiling using the new competency framework. As a result, the re-established baseline of the agency is at 79.51% or 92 personnel with gaps were identified out of the 449 agency-wide personnel.



The PFDA-Navotas Fish Port Complex (PFDA-NFPC) in Metro Manila is the first fish port placed under the jurisdiction of the PFDA Situated in a vast 49-hectare land in the mid-eastern part of the Manila Bay, it is considered the premier fish center of the Philippines and one of the largest fish ports in Asia. Since it began its operations in 1977, it has been providing fish and fishery products to markets and institutional buyers in Metro Manila and other parts of Luzon.

The PFDA-NFPC provides post-harvest facilities for harbor operations such as drydocking, net mending area, i.e. water and fuel conveyance and product transshipment. It is also considered a major site for unloading and marketing of fish from commercial and municipal fishing vessels. Through the Regional Fish Port Project for the Greater Capital Region, the rehabilitation and improvement of PFDA-NFPC is currently underway. Once finished, it is expected to become a world-class integrated trading hub for various fishery commodities.

The General Santos Fish Port Complex (PFDA-GSFPC) is located in Barangay Tambler. General Santos City in South Cotabato. With an area of 11 hectares, it provides fishery post-harvest facilities for commercial and municipal fishing vessels, market traders, processors and exporters in SOCCSKSARGEN. Because of its role as a major producer and exporter of tuns in the country and in Asia Pacific, it earned the moniker. Tuns Capital of the Philippines' in the 1970s. Since then the FPDA-GSFPC has catered to the robust tuna industry as the primary provider of post-harvest facilities and infrastructure

that facilitates the handling trading and distribution of tuna. Under the PFDA initiatives, the Wharf III extension of the PFDA – General Santos Fish Port Complex (PFDA-GSFPC) is moving closer to its completion in addition to this, the PFDA has pipelined various projects for the future improvement of the port. This includes the forthcoming expansion and improvement of the PFDA-GSFPC amounting to PHP 28 billion

The Davao Fish Port Complex (PFDA-DFPC) is a 4.5-hectare fish port complex situated in Daliao. Toril District in Davao City, Established in 1995, the DFPC has become attractive to foreign foncy-line vessels thereby making it an alternative transshipment port in the Asia Pacific Region It also serves as a hub for the collection, processing storage, and pockaging of fish and fishery products for distribution to both domestic and export markets.

The ongoing rehabilitation and improvement of PFDA-DFPC is expected to support the region's growing agro-industrial sector, spuring further economic growth in Mindianso. Given its strategic location and current role as a regional fish port complex the improvement and modernization project is expected to enhance the country's socioeconomic integration with other major trading hubs in the Asia-Pacific region.



The Iloilo Fish Port Complex (PFDA - IFPC) is located in a 21-hectare reclaimed area at Barangay Tanza, Iloilo City in Visayas. Once considered a traditional landing site of bagnetters and other fishing bancas in Iloilo City and nearby towns. It currently serves as a major fish port in Visayas with a vast area of raw land open for lease for commercial spaces, communication facilities and agri-fishery-related factories; its strategic location as an interisland port with a natural harbor makes it an ideal location for trade and industry.

The ongoing renovation and improvement of the PFDA-IFPC is expected to contribute to a more competitive fishing industry in the entire Visayas region by attracting more investors and locators, particularly fish processors. by providing more income and employment for fisherfolks and their families.

LUCENA FISH PORT COMPLEX

The Lucena Fish Port Complex (PFDA-LFPC) in CALABARZON is located in a 7.8-hectare reclaimed area at Barangay Dalahican in Lucena City, Quezon. Among the current services offered by the PFDA-LFPC are the unloading and marketing of fish both from commercial and municipal fishing vessels as well as 6sh supplies from overland vehicles.

It is currently being developed under the Nationwide Fish Ports Project Package III of the government. The project includes the construction, rehabilitation and improvement of the fish port's existing facilities, such as pier, market hall, cold storage, ice plant and wastewater treatment plant. The newly-improved PFDA-LFPC is expected to be fully operational in March 2023.





The Zamboanga Fish Port Complex (PFDA-ZFPC) is situated in a 12.5-hectare complex in Barangay Sangal, Zamboanga del Sur Its establishment in 1985 strengthened the linkages and trade links with our neighboring Asia Pacific countries that has been in place since the 1800s. It is considered the largest marine products processing center in Region 9.

The PFDA-ZFPC is currently undergoing renovation and improvement to provide better facilities for fisherfolks, vessel operators, fish brokers, traders and processors, storage and ice plant operators, and agricultural support groups in the region.

The Bulan Fish Port Complex (PFDA-BFPC) was officially upgraded from a municipal fish port to its current Regional Fish Port (RFP) status in 2017, making it the most recent regional fish port to be placed under the management of PFDA Located in the south-westernmost tip of Luzon Island. It is accessible to municipal and commercial vessels coming from Northern Samar, Masbate, and Leyte. The PFDA-BFPC jointly manages the

operations of Tacloban City Municipal Fish Port (TCFP) in Leyte with the local government unit.

The PFDA-BFPC is one of the ports that is being rehabilitated through the PFDA initiative, with an additional ice plant currently being built.

The Sual Fish Port (PFDA-SFP) is constructed on a 3.8-hectare reclaimed land located at Poblacion. Sual in Pangasinan It currently plays a significant role as the only transshipment port in northern Luzon, not only for fish caught in Lingayen Gulf but 45 of regeneral commodities to Dagupan City, the center of commerce and marketing in Pangasinan province.

The renovation and improvement project of the PFDA-SFP aims to accommodate bigger fishing boats and cargo vessels coming from different parts of the country. Set to be linished by the end of 2023, the modernization of the PFDA-SFP is critical to the development of the fisheries sector of the country.

PFDA MUNICIPAL FISH PORTS AND OTHER FISHERY POST-HARVEST FACILITIES

Pursuant to its mandate, the PFDA sustained the operation of the **nine (9) Regional Fish Ports (RFPs)** namely, Navotas Idolo, Zamboanga, Camailgan, Lucena, Sual Davoo, General Santos, and Bulan Fish Ports. The fish port located in Tacloban Leyte is under joint management by PFDA and LGU.

As of 31 December 2022, the volume of fish unloaded at the regional fish port complexes reached a total of 543,146 metric tons (MT). The General Santos and Navotas Fish Port Complexes were the two (2) biggest contributors to fish unloading with a total of 48% and 36% contributions, respectively. The remaining 16% was however, contributed by the other seven (7) RFPs. The total number of fishing and non-fishing vessel arrivals reached 90,727.

Insofar as processing activity is concerned 1787-99 MT of shery and nonfishery products were processed in the refrigeration facilities of General Santos, Zamboanga, and Camaligan Fish Ports Moreover, the total volume of ice produced at Zamboanga, Davao, and General Santos Fish Ports was recorded at 28,985 c9 MT.

As of date, the agency constructed 136 fish ports and fish landings nationwide operating under the oversight of the nine PFDA RFPs.

In addition for ice requirement and food safety, the PFDA currently has seven operational ice-making machines of different magnitudes and cold storages of varying capacities all over the country.

In line with the government's privatization scheme, the PFDA continued to lease out **four IPCS** to the private sector located in the provinces of Masbate, Negros Occidental Sultan Kudarat, and Surigao del Norte.













Philippine Fisheries Development Authority celebrated its 46th anniversary with the theme Nagkakaisang PFDA tungo sa Mas Pinalakas na Sektor ng Pangisdaan i, held at the Philippine Coconut Authority Auditorium and via livestream on August II. 2022.

Before the main anniversary program, the PFDA Central Office (CO) and Regional Fish Ports (RFPs) held a simultaneous Thanksgiving Mass that was followed by the blessing of the newly renovated CO building

The program began with the premier of the PFDA Corporate Video 2022 that showcased the agency's flagship infrastructure and rehabilitation projects and the isDA ON THE GO program. The corporate video also featured messages of appreciation and well-wishes from clients and stakeholders nationwide.

Assistant General Manager (AGM) Ms. Inis R de Vera thanked everyone who attended today's live program physically and via livestream. She said that 46 years is such a great achievement for the agency and there will still be challenges ahead, but the PFDA must deliver and work together to offectively perform the agency's mandate and achieve its vision of providing better service to its stakeholders and support the Department of Agriculture's goal of making food available and affordable to the consuming public.

"Over the years, the PFDA remains committed and strong for a unified purpose of supporting the fishing industry by developing, operating, and managing sound and sustainable post-harvest facilities. Let us work together and strive harder to achieve more milestones towards a stronger fisheries industry and food-resilient Philippines." AGM de Vera said.

AGM de Vera also sent her deepest gratitude to Atty Glen A Pangapalan for his good stewardship and for being a team player in propelling PFDA to perform well.

Afterwards, the PFDA recognized the extensive service and commitment of its Service Loyalty Awardees in the Central Office and RFPs who contributed a significant amount of time assisting the Filipino fisherfolk.













PFDA CO, FIVE RFPS MAINTAIN ISO 9001 CERTIFICATION

Despite a very challenging year, PFDA and five Regional Fish Ports (RFP) maintained their International Organization for Standardization (ISO) 90012015 certificates after successfully complying with the requirements of the annual surveillance audit.

The PFDA Central Office (CO) and RFPs, namely the Navotas Fish Port Complex (NFPC), liolio Fish Port Complex (IFPC), Lucena Fish Port Complex (LFPC). Davao Fish Port Complex (IFPC), and General Santos Fish Port Complex (GSFPC), have secured their ISO certification in their respective units.

The PFDA CO has been awarded ISO 9001 recertification by the TÚV Rheinland on December 17.

For four consecutive years, the Central Office has been providing quality project management services to its clients, stakeholders, and industry partners and meeting international standards on Quality Management System (QMS)

Quality Management Representative (QMR) and Corporate Planning and MIS Department Manager Ms. Gina J. Reyes thanked the TÜV Rheinland Audit Team for allowing the PFDA management to learn more about improving the agency's QMS in the future. Ms. Reyes said, "we are proud of what we achieved this year, and our collective effort in the ISO recertification process has bore fruit."





The PFDA-NFPC passed its surveillance audit on November 4. followed by the successful ISO audit of the PFDA-IFPC and PFDA-LFPC on November 25 and 29. respectively, by SOCOTEC Certification Philippines, Inc.



Subsequently, the PFDA-DFPC and PFDA-GSFPC ended the year with another milestone after passing SOCOTEC's ISO surveillance audit on December 2 and 13, respectively.

ISDA ON THE GO ACTIVITIES

This 2022, the PFDA isDA on the Go (IOTG) project participated in trading fish and fishery products at the Department of Agriculture (DA)'s KADIWA ni Ani at Kita Program in partnership with Local Government Units and cooperatives nationwide

To make sure that almost every family can have access to pocket-friendly and quality fresh-frozen fish, the IOTG project has identified communities in strategic locations not only within Metro Manila. but also in various provinces like Rizal Bulacan, Tarlac, Pampanga, Nueva Ecija, Cavite, Laguna. Batangas, and Sorsogon In addition, the iOTG Program was also launched in Southern Leyte. Bohol. and Davao Region in partnersip with the Cooperative Development Authority (CDA).

This year, the iOTG project sold 57.17 metric tons (MT) of fish and fishery products at affordable







As the agency's step to aiding Typhoon Odette victims, Philippine Fisheries Development Authority (PFDA) has conducted simultaneous distribution of relief goods and construction materials worth P10 million to over 7250 typhoon-affected families in Sogod, Southern Leyte: Surigao City: Siargao Island; and Ubay, Bohol on January 26 to

Led by PFDA General Manager Atty, Glen A Pangapalan and Assistant General Manager Ms Iris R. de Vera, the agency has allocated 10 million pesos from the PFDA corporate funds to assist various provinces in the southern portion of the country that have been severely affected by the strongest storm of 2021.

Two 10-wheeler trucks filled with three tons of fishery products and three tons of construction materials from the PFDA – Davao Fish Port Complex (PFDA-DFPC) arrived in Sogod, Southern Leyte to aid more Odette-stricken barangays.

Also, the PFDA - Central Office and PFDA - Navotas Fish Port Complex (PFDA-NFPC) also distributed 100 boxes of frozen fish and 500 relief boxes to typhoon-hit families together with a truckload of construction materials like galvanized iron sheets (yero). umbrella nails, hammers, rolls of tie wire, cut saw, and canvasses to Odette victims in Ubay, Bohol

Meanwhile, the team composed of PFDA - General Santos Fish Port (PFDA-GSFPC) and PFDA-DFPC delivered food packs and construction materials to more than 5,000 typhoon-affected families in Surigao City and Siargao Island.

Typhoon Odette made its first landfall in the province of Surigao del Norte Torrential rains, strong winds, and storm surges wreck havoc in the area which rendered many families homeless and in need of help. Immediately after, the typhoon made its landfall in Siargao Island which resulted in a very devastating aftermath in one of the country's top tourist destinations.













AUTOMATION OF PFDA SERVICES

The agency has committed the development of three (3) systems – Client Digital Queueing System. Document Management System and Online Transaction System – by the end of CY 2022.

In addition, four (4) systems — Job Request System (JRS). Key Performance Indicator (KPI) System. Online Competency and Profiling System (OCPS), and Preventive Maintenance System (PMS) — and the enhancement of three (3) systems — Integrated Corporate Reporting System (ICRS). Corporate Information System Portal, and Administrative Management information System were installed and implemented at the Central Office.

Through these online systems, the PFDA aims to give excellent customer service to its clients and stakeholders nationwise. With faster communication and a user-friendly interface, these systems can provide secured and accurate data both for PFDA employees and external institutions allies.







PFDA WHISTLEBLOWING POLICY

PFDA is committed to uphold the highest ethical standards in public service. Its officials and employees shall at all times be accountable to the people and shall discharge their duties with utmost responsibility, integrity, competence and loyalty.

Coverage

These guidelines shall cover all PFDA officials and employees.

Disclosures from non-PFDA employees shall be dealt in accordance with pertinent existing laws, rules and regulations on whistleblowing/ reporting issued by competent authorities.

Definition of Terms

Whistleblowing is the disclosure of and/or giving of evidence to information that a whistleblower reasonably believes constitutes graft and corrupt practices or any illegal doings

Protected Disclosure refers to the deliberate and voluntary disclosure by an official or employee who has relevant information of an actual, suspected or anticipated wrongdoing.

A Whistleblower refers to any PFDA employee or group of employees who makes protected disclosures.

Retaliatory Action pertains to negative or obstructive responses or reactions to a disclosure of misconduct or wrongdoing taken against the whistleblower and/or those officials and employees supporting him/her.

- The General Manager or his duly authorized representative
 To the Chairman of the Board of Directors, if the official involved is the General Manager

Rights of a Whistleblower

- . No administrative action shall be entertained or pursued by the Agency against any PFDA official or employee who make disclosures or reports deemed protected under these
- A whistleblower shall be protected from retaliatory actions.
- . A whistleblower that has an obligation by way of oath, rule or practice to maintain confidentiality of information shall not be liable for the breach of confidentiality if he/she makes a protected disclosure of such information.
- Any official or employee who refuses to follow orders to perform an act that would constitute a violation of this provision shall likewise be protected from retallatory actions.
- At all times during and after the protected disclosure, and throughout and after any proceeding taken thereon, the whistleblower is entitled to confidentiality as to: his/her identity; and the subject matter of his/her disclosure.

Protection of Witnesses

Any official or employee who testifies in any proceeding arising from a protected disclosure shall have the same rights as that of the whistleblower.

Assistance to the Whistleblower

PFDA shall grant legal assistance to the whistleblower if the need arises and in cases of grave threats to life and/or safety, appropriate action shall be taken for the protection and support of the whistleblower.

Protected Disclosure

The whistleblower shall be entitled to protection and assistance under this Office Order after the investigation conducted showed valid basis and provided that all the following requisites are fulfilled:

- The whistleblower has personal knowledge of facts and information covered by the disclosure;
- The disclosure is made voluntarily, in writing and under oath;
- The disclosure pertains to a matter not yet the subject of a complaint already filed with, or investigated by concerned Department/Unit of PFDA unless the disclosure is necessary for the effective and successful prosecution, or necessary for the effective and successful prosecution, or would constitute a material evidence not yet in the possession of the Agency;
- The whistleblower formally undertakes to assist and participate in proceedings commenced in connection with the subject matter of the disclosure:
- The information given by the whistleblower contains sufficient particulars and, he/she submits or undertakes to submit material evidence that may be in his/her possession.

Procedure for Protected Disclosure

Immediately upon receipt of the disclosure, the General Manager, or the official he may designate, shall:

- Evaluate the disclosure if the same qualifies as protected disclosure under this Office Order within a period of FIFTEEN WORKING DAYS from receipt thereof;
- Conduct appropriate actions in accordance with applicable laws, rules and regulations, should the report qualifies as protected disclosure;
- Ensure that the whistleblower's report and other related documents are at all times placed in a folder labeled "CONFIDENTIAL" and properly kept in a locked drawer or cabinet for the safety of the documents;
- Ensure that all the rights of a whistleblower contained herein are accorded to him/her, should the report qualifies as protected disclosure

Unprotected Disclosure

The following shall not be deemed protected disclosure under this Office Order:

- Disclosure concerning merits of office policies;
- · Absolutely false and misleading disclosures;
- . Disclosures that are later retracted by the whistleblower for any reason.
- · Disclosures which later appear to be absolutely groundless or without basis. . Disclosures made by an official or employee in connection with a matter subject
- of his official investigation; and · An official or employee who makes a disclosure deemed unprotected shall not enjoy any immunity, or other right or privilege accorded under this Office Order.

Disclosure Made by a Party to an Act Being Reported

A disclosure made by an officer or employee who is a party to the act being reported may be deemed protected disclosure and maybe entitled to all the rights provided herein, subject to the following:

- a) The whistleblower complies with the conditions set herein:
- b) The whistleblower should not appear to be most guilty;
- c) The whistleblower testifies in accordance with his/her disclosure; d) The disclosure is necessary for the proper prosecution of the act
- Any official or employee who violates the protection of confidentiality of a protected disclosure shall be subjected to disciplinary and/or criminal action as may be warranted by pertinent laws, rules and regulations.
- Any official or employee, who does, causes or encourages retaliatory actions as defined herein against the whistleblower shall be subjected to administrative, civil and/ or criminal proceedings.
- False, misleading and malicious disclosures shall be sufficient ground for the termination of the protection or assistance to whistleblowers under this Office Order including the termination of their immunity from administrative cases, civil and/or criminal actions as may be appropriate.
- Any official or employee under obligation to report a disclosure under this Office Order, or who falls to act thereon or cause an investigation thereof, shall be liable for disciplinary action.
- Any official or employee who, with malice or bad faith, makes a false disclosure may be subject to administrative, civil and/or criminal actions, as may be warranted.
